Thoughts on "Nine Eleven" after ten years.

Sometimes when I drive the few miles from my house to I-5 or on the return trip, I go down a curving street. On one side is a commercial area and on the south it is still largely rural. But it is also the entrance to Todd M. Beamer High School, the newest High School built in the Federal Way School District. I often think of that day now ten years in the past, known by the number that has become its name, Nine-Eleven.

Todd Beamer was one of the passengers of United Flight 93, who participated in the passenger's attempt to retake control of the airplane from hijackers whose colleagues on three other planes crashed into both of the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Todd and the others were determined not to allow Flight 93 to be used in similar destruction. He had been in contact with a Customer Service Representative by phone, but probably not realizing that she could still hear, said to the others with him words that have taken on a strength of their own: *"Are you guys ready? Let's Roll!"*

On the Tenth Anniversary of Nine Eleven, many words, memorials, and stories will be shared and retold. These few words will be my attempt to add some thoughts of my own, and will certainly not be everything that should be said. For all of us who remember this event, where we were when we heard about it, or saw the newscasts for the first time, it will be our ongoing task to recollect, remember, and pray that God would lead us through this life changing event as individuals and as a nation, in

Along the way we had several meetings with Bishop Boerger and his assistant, Jan Nesse. Their job is to help us to move forward in the call committee process as well as to explain the reasons for conducting the process according to Synod guidelines. There are a multitude of hoops to jump through in order to do a good job.

During the month of August we have spent our time creating thoughtful interview questions. Prior to doing actual interviews,

ways that would please God and bring peace to the world.

We were all different for a few weeks or months after that September morning in 2001. We saw each other differently. This attack that was meant to destroy us instead drew us together. We seemed largely more respectful of each other, and recognized the gift of life in others. The U.S. Flag flew from cars and trucks and makeshift flagpoles. People began to sing songs not heard in a while, like <u>God Bless America</u> and <u>America the</u> <u>Beautiful</u>. For a short time, our unity was raised to a higher level.

Certainly not always. Some wanted to attack the evil people who did this horrible act, but not knowing who it was, would attack anyone that looked different from what they thought "real Americans" looked like. As often happens when we take justice and righteousness into our own hands, many suffered many forms of abuse and scorn even though they were innocent of this crime.

Situations of crisis bring out either the best or the worst in us, and in extreme crises, the difference is even more clearly seen. While a dozen or so terrorists wanted to destroy as many lives as they could, members of the Fire Department of New York and the Law Enforcement agencies did everything they could to protect the lives of strangers, even at the cost of their own. Todd Beamer and others on Flight 93 became heroes in ways none of them expected as they boarded the plane that morning. It still happens. Recently, an outdoor stage blew down on top of several people. Many from the stands came down to raise the staging by hand in a united effort while others pulled the injured out of danger. Whether it is hurricanes or floods, or runaway vehicles, or stopping a crime or assault in progress, it is often an ordinary person who does extraordinary things.

We also see the other side of the coin in far too many circumstances. Flash mobs in organized theft, looting and violence, an attitude of "Me first" that leaves everyone endangered, these things can be found as well.

If I could have anything from this Tenth Anniversary of Nine Eleven, it would be that we would recapture, and hold, the respect that we had for one another for those weeks after September in 2001. I would also hope that we could look for the best in ourselves and each other that could be used in times of crisis and challenge. The challenges of today are much less dramatic, but are still in need of our best efforts.

May God Bless us and use us as God intends. Let's Roll.

ELCA Assembly adopts Genetics Social Statement, Plan for the Church

The ELCA Churchwide Assembly met in Orlando, FL from August 15-19, 2011. Attendees included 1025 voting members together with resource persons and advisory members including MLC member Mark Johnson who is a member of the 33 member ELCA national Church Council.

The Assembly, which is the highest legislative body of the ELCA, adopted its 11th and latest social statement entitled "Genetics, Faith and Responsibility" by a 942 to 34 vote. Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson stated: "Social statements are important documents for us as a church...and guide us as we 'step forward as a public church' because they form the basis for both this church's public policy and my public speech as presiding bishop."

The Assembly also adopted a series of resolutions derived from its Living into the Future Together (LIFT) Task Force and report. According to an ELCA news release, "The LIFT resolutions address the role of the ELCA's churchwide organization to accompany congregations and synods, build capacity for evangelical witness and service, strengthen interdependent relationships, promote God's vision of a multicultural and multiethnic church, coordinate global mission and relief work, and lead in new ways theological reflection and deliberation on the identity and mission of this church."


The texts of the Genetics Social Statement and the LIFT resolutions can be read on the ELCA website: www.ELCA.org/assembly. The Churchwide Assembly also voted to provide for flexibility in the number of Church Council members elected in the future to ensure the presence of experience and expertise in all needed areas and further, voted to change the frequency of assemblies from a biennial to a triennial cycle, starting with the 2016 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. 




Activity Bags

Answer to Last Month's Trivia:

The answers vary, but there is the Black Hymnal, Red Hymnal, Green Hymnal, blue With One Voice, and the Cranberry Hymnal (which the choir uses now for some music). That's at least 5, maybe more!



We've been told this since our days in Sunday school: We want to give and we need to give gladly. A spirit of generosity isn't enough to guide us in our decisions. What else does Scripture have to say on the subject? Three kinds of financial giving are mentioned in the Bible: offerings, tithes and alms. Understanding what they mean helps us achieve a thoughtful, balanced plan for our cheerful giving.

Offerings and Tithing

On the first day of every week, each of you is to put aside and save whatever extra you earn, so that collections need not be taken when I come (1 Corinthians 16:2).

The faith practice of making a regular financial offering to your congregation is grounded in a "first fruits" philosophy.

We might think of this giving as "business as usual." You pay the rent, you buy groceries and you contribute regularly to help carry out God's mission in the world. Your generosity isn't an afterthought; it's part of your dayin- and-day-out joyful response as a child of God.

These offerings first help to support local ministries, outreach and more. Your congregation then shares a portion of your offering—mission support—with your synod and the churchwide expression. *Stories of Faith in Action* is filled with examples of how mission support enables us to do God's work with our hands.

Many Christians talk about their regular contribution as a tithe. This helps them to differentiate between their financial commitment to their congregation and the special offerings they designate to specific causes. Such causes may include ELCA World Hunger, a program of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, your congregation's building fund or a pan-Lutheran organization such as Lutheran World Relief.

We encourage your designated support of these worthy causes. But we also recommend that these offerings are given above and beyond, and never in place of, your commitment to your regular congregational offering.

Biblical Advice for Cheerful Givers

Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, for God loves a cheerful giver. (2 Corinthians 9:7)

Alms

Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys (Luke 12:33).

Alms are our compassionate, heartfelt response to the people Jesus mentioned in Matthew 25: those "least" of our sisters and brothers who are "less" than we in circumstance only and always our equal in their humanity.

This is our most personal and spontaneous kind of giving in response to people in need. Think about the homeless man you see everyday by the bus stop or the family in your congregation whose home was lost during a fire. Your outreach makes God's love for them feel very real and very immediate; your kindness reveals Christ's presence within them as well.

Time and Talent

It's also important to remember that when we focus exclusively on giving in terms of money alone, we lose sight of the bigger picture. God calls us to be generous in all areas our lives and invites us to explore the many opportunities to share ourselves through our time and talent.

When we ground our giving in a biblical context, our financial generosity becomes an expression of our love for God, for our neighbor and for ourselves. We are new people in Christ: compassionate and eager to share.

We give cheerfully because God has given us so much.
