

Some comments as we plan for the support of 2012.

Three ministers were talking among themselves about the best way to figure out how much to give to God. One said he drew a circle on a piece of paper about the size of a beach ball and threw his money up in the air. Whatever fell outside of the circle was God's and the rest was his to do with as he pleased. The second minister used a similar idea. He used his Bible. After throwing his money up, whatever remained on top of the Bible was God's and the rest was his. The third minister said he just threw the money up in the air. He figured that whatever God wanted, God could keep, so whatever landed on the floor was his.

Pastors also struggle with how to handle our own stewardship just as you do. In the interest of disclosure, let me tell you how I have worked this through in hopes that it might be a help as you consider your own commitment.

I tithe. 10% of my take home income.

Heat, lights, worship materials, paychecks of those who work here including my own, and many more things, all need to be supported. The simplicity of this is that I can easily figure out this amount in my head, and I pay once a month. I have learned a few things about tithing. It is always easier if I write this check first. Let the "discretionary spending" come out of the leftovers. I also know that if I give this first, my thinking about the other 90% changes. I become a more careful manager of everything that God has

given me. I have never met one person who has taken tithing on as a challenge that has found it to be a mistake. "There have been some pretty tight months, and sometimes we might have to budget a payment, but God has always provided enough," they will say. I have found the same thing.

I also know that God has given me much more than my take home amount would reflect. I look for opportunities to give more, especially for missions that I find meaningful to me. I love the thought that a \$10 mosquito proof bed net in Africa may allow a child to grow to adulthood. Will they be the one to help lead the development of their nation? I support things like the Maasai Girls School, and World Hunger, and any number of other wonderful things. (When I look for socks for the homeless, I thank God that He created COSTCO.) This is when the giving becomes downright fun. I am learning to be a cheerful giver. Magnolia is a very generous congregation when it comes to various kinds of mission. Keep it up. I am honored by your generosity.

None of us learns how to do something by a simple infusion of information. It takes time, with a lot of steps along the way. We learn to master one level before we move on to the next. This happens in learning to manage the gifts that God has entrusted to us for our use. You are already at one step. I encourage you to think, pray, plan, and then take the next small step on the way.

Whenever Pastor Krag – the usually conservative dresser that he is – comes to church wearing a t-shirt and a couple of strings of beads, as he did on October 2nd, you might guess he has been up to something. It all became somewhat clearer when he used the "Announcement Time" to explain.

Pastor Krag's extended family — the Binns's, Shelton's and Grimsby's — six of them afoot and pushing Mary in her wheelchair — had spent Saturday forenoon participating in the "Out of Darkness" community walk in support of the annual fundraising walk around Green Lake for the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.

The extended family was walking in memory of their beloved Ben Shelton, who left us much too young two and a half years ago on Ash Wednesday night. The family members were joined by several of Ben's fellow machinists from the Belshaw firm. In all, 763 people participated in the walk, in memory of lost loved ones. Nearly \$80,000 was raised, with "Team Benjo" among the top ten fund-raisers with more than \$2,200 pledged.

Pastor Krag says that if he is still up to it next year, he will invite all of us to participate. Then we can ALL wear t-shirts and beads to church!

What a beautiful weekend to be out the Great Outdoors at Camp Lutherwood where an active group of women from our church met to spend quality time together. The time was spent walking trails



Trivia Answer from Last Month: Is there a Story in the stained glass windows?

Yes, the stained glass windows in the sanctuary have stories behind them. This month we'll begin with the windows on the east side.

The windows on the east side represent the "I AM" phrases in the gospels. Starting at the front:



I am the DOOR—a door stands ajar revealing the bright gold an dred designs of vitality, beauty, and excitement of life that opens through Jesus who is indeed the door.

I am the VINE—also the branches which must bear fruit achieved by abiding in Christ, to witness in word an ddeed to the love and grace of God.





I am the WAY, the TRUTH and the LIFE the golden way or road of Christ parallels the brighter, light section supported by a blending of white and gold telling of the truth that Jesus Christ who walks the Way with us is God.

I am the BREAD—bread images are clear, but looking closely we see the cross design and the loaf is the corpus of the crucifix, bringing to mind the Last Supper, our heritage of the Eucharist.





I am the LIGHT of the world—a bolt of lighting illuminating the world could refer to our Lord's return or to Christ's glorious power an denergy that floods the world. Actually, you are looking through a window and just catching a glimpse of Christ's vital light that floods into the world.

So there you have it. Watch for coming descriptions of the other stained glass windows around MLC. These descriptions were taken from the Dedication Service Booklet, written by Dr. Ernst Schwidder, who also designed and carved the altar, pulpit and baptismal font.





Contruction Update

As of September 16th, the excavation of 3,200 tons of soil from the Village Cove site has been completed. The next step will involve the EPA conducting their



final soil testing and issuing their environmental report. We have been advised that the EPA might take up to three months to issue their final report, so we are anticipating the EPA approval that we need to start the application process for our construction loan by January 2012.


