get there, (Terminal A). I found my way to the gate, including running up an escalator, and dodging and weaving through crowds. I was two minutes late.

When things go wrong for Delta in Atlanta, they can go wrong in really big ways. I, and hundreds of other stranded travelers were stuck in a city we had not expected, and were at the mercy of an overloaded Customer Service force to find out when we might be going home. I waited in line for 2 and a half hours, to find out I could get out the next morning. Delta did what they could, but I would be spending the night in the terminal.

I am a people watcher. I don't mind spending time watching strangers walk past. I find them interesting. But now, I was one of them, and I knew it. How would I respond? How would others? Could we make the situation better or worse? I tried to get to know those around me in line. There was a mother anxious to get home to her kids aged 7 to 16 in San Francisco. There was a young couple from Seattle. He was an Amazon computer expert, she was one who traveled often in her job in sales for an Espresso equipment firm, and they had dogs at home. (I saw pictures from their phones.) The young women behind me were sisters from Alaska. We tried to give each other time to leave the line for a bite to eat, or a rest break while we kept their place. We told each other funny stories, and tried to keep our spirits up while waiting in line for hours. I tried to remember that our ancestors would travel across the country in wagons, and a very good day for them would be 40 miles. Having to wait in a terminal for 12 hours where it was warm and dry, before flying across the country in 5 hours seemed like a minor inconvenience in comparison.

Others acted as if the world was at an end, or that someone was out to make their journey as miserable as possible.

Some were angry, some merely peeved. But we all had to wait in line together. Those who responded in more positive ways came through the ordeal in better shape than those who only found the negative of the night. I hope I passed this unplanned final exam.

Magnolia, and all congregations, will face challenges in the future. The challenge will not be as important to the future of the congregation, as how Magnolia responds to the challenge. Keep the faith, and let your best thoughts and insights see you through the night, even a night in Terminal A of Atlanta Airport. God will be with you there as well as in Seattle.



# Greetings from Japan

Hi everyone! We missed a Christmas/New Year's newsletter unfortunately, as Ashley was knocked out for weeks, sleeping at least 12 hours a day (those days seem so far gone now...) So we're writing one for summer instead as an update and to announce the upcoming birth of our little one!

As some people don't want to know the gender yet, we won't announce that here (but feel free to email us if you're curious). So far baby seems to be healthy, and we were fortunate enough to find a nice, flexible, doctor, who actually speaks English. Women in Japan typically give birth in hospitals or women's clinics (sometimes midwife clinics), and are usually expected to stay at the hospital or clinic for 5-7 days. We lucked out - our clinic only requires a 4 day stay.

**Ashley** is doing well - though she slept away most of the first trimester, her energy returned during the second and she has been as busy as ever, if not more. She's now in the third trimester (30 weeks as of June 13).

Ashley still does part-time **freelance work** for ExpatWomen.com, having taken on a greater role helping the director over the past year. She continues to blog at **Surviving in Japan** (http://www.survivingnjapan.com) - which has grown exponentially in the past year and few months. She receives questions from other expats either living in Japan or planning to move to Japan almost daily, and has grown her readership to over 400 subscribers, not including over 500 people on Facebook and 3,200 on Twitter. She's very excited to see what will happen with the blog in the next year and has exciting plans in store (though, will have to see how much time/energy she has to implement these once baby arrives).

She was approached by **The Japan Times** in February to take over Lifelines - a weekly column primarily devoted to answering questions people write in about various topics pertaining to living in Japan, anywhere from how to find English-language magazines to the various rules pertaining to the pension program in Japan (the latter has been SO much fun). David also contributes to the column by helping conduct research that requires fluent Japanese-ability. After a year and a half volunteering at the nearby elementary school with their after school program, he decided it was time to move on and finished his involvement there at the end of April. During Spring break, he started playing **baseball** with the school team and was quickly asked by the teachers in charge to **become a coach**. David agreed and so has been staying after school for practices and goes to games at least one day on the weekends. The coaches have appreciated his help and recently asked him to be in the dugout for the big summer tournament starting in a couple of weeks. David is really excited about this amazing opportunity.

As for school, David has been really excited and energetic about his work. Especially since he is starting his third year at the school and all the students know him. He is starting his fifth and final year on the **JET program**,




